... a person with a disability is easily offended.

... a person with a disability is dissatisfied with his/her quality of life and is seeking pity.

... that a person who does not appear to have a disability or who uses assistive devices intermittently, instead of all the time, is faking or imagining their disability.

... companions accompanying a person with a disability are there strictly to render services.

... a person with a disability will be receptive to personal questions, particularly in a public setting.

... that when a person with a disability is in public place, he/she is being escorted by a caretaker, instead of traveling alone.
